# **Minister**

certainly lifted our profile and made us easier to be found.

We are grateful for Bill and Nola Brogden who left money for a sign. It's surely much grander than they could ever have dreamed. And we are very thankful to Joe who gifted his time and talent to design and complete the work.

A new initiative this year was Cuppa, Chat n Play. We were keen to create something that





was free, enabling access to all. Tanya Carter stepped up to lead this, with a team of helpers, and Elaine Telford baking for morning tea. It was great to watch it flourish, with the last term really gaining traction.

An outlandish statement in

2020 that 'if you get the Gospel wrong, you get everything wrong' developed into a Monday night series in March and May as we unpacked this. Mick Duncan and Pauline Simonsen led us as we learned

how to Know, Live, and Show the Gospel.

Not that there was all work and no play, nine of us went south to Wellington for a free tour through Government House. The lunch at Maranui Café afterwards was excellent too.

We also had lunches on Sundays, one welcomed newcomers, 31 in around 18 months, another couple for the worship team, and a winter soup lunch in two homes.

But the best was the hot ham sandwich lunch in December, as a means of thanking everyone who had contributed to our church during the year. It was so good, another brilliant Barb Funnell idea!

to expect, what the costs might be, how to plan. And a Hymn Sing, where favourites from the green Baptist Hymn Book and others were aired.

Sunday morning worship has been a real variety due to the pandemic. We responded to varying Levels of restrictions, and then the 'Traffic Light' settings, finding ourselves with gathering limits of 100, 50, 25 and even 10 at one stage. And there was another lock down that saw us fully on Zoom for a

few weeks. In a response to these limits we even tried two services each Sunday in December, with around 30 at each setting. It was a good experience but did require a lot of extra energy. While we had

some scares during the year, no Covid flourished in Feilding for which we are grateful.



A couple of Sunday afternoon events saw 28 people stay to look into Funeral Matters, what When it came to preaching, the highlight of the year had to be working through Revelation in two blocks (seven Sundays then five) shared with Geoff and Sonja Dixon from Hokowhitu Baptist.

Something of a church history lesson resulted after a nationwide requirement to read through church minutes and records from 1950 to 2020. That's 70 years worth, minutes from; Church, Deacons, Elders, Girls Brigade, Boys Brigade, Sunday School (who met every month until 1987 with a page and a half of notes each meeting. Why did we have to do this? To feed into a NZ Baptist submission to a Royal Commission into Abuse in Faith Based Institutions. Sadly our past meant treating this task with the gravity it deserved. Thanks to those who helped with the reading.

There were some fascinating findings, like the special church meeting called in 1977 to vote on whether to purchase an overhead projector.

In the wider community in 2021 we had involvement briefly with Woodlands Retirement Village church services, Coombrae Rest Home services, and hosted the inter-church prayer meeting on the first Sunday of each month. We also worked with other church leaders in Easter and Christmas events.

# Little Lights

One of the best things about a clear, dark night is being able to star gaze, to admire God's amazing creation in a vast universe. As His word says, He determines the number of the stars and calls them each by name. It puts things into perspective and is a joy to behold His workmanship. It also is a joy and privilege to teach our youngest generation of children at our church.

At the beginning of the year we looked at the book of Revelation. We had a visual story and illustration on the board that was added to as each week progressed. This enabled us to better grasp and understand what was happening and the many events and details that were involved. We continued our lessons throughout the year using the Knowing God curriculum that is filled with lots of great stories about the Bible and key themes, fun game ideas and some crafts. Then we move onto a story and teaching time while enjoying some morning tea snacks. A game normally follows and lastly a craft activity that consolidates the learning that has taken place.

I joined the team in this new venture without having been part of Mainly

Music, so it was easy to have a fresh approach. We began with the very firm foundation of a team who prayed together, supported each other and willingly shared their time and skills. Each session was relaxed, with a short structured time of Bible-related music and a story or activity, before morning tea and more free play (with plenty of time for adults to talk together)

Elaine's outstanding baking skills delighted everyone each week. Eleanor's sparkling personality and warm ways showed God's love to everyone, especially newcomers. Heather is an absolute machine in the kitchen

and her bright manner and organisational skills ensured we

were all fed at the perfect time, with the cleaning up happening in the blink of an eye. Brenda is famous for her rapport with children, and there were moments when she was the perfect person to

dry a few tears and keep a tired child entertained and happy. My role was to plan and lead each session and communicate any changes in rules regarding Covid-19. Everyone worked together to set up and pack down the toys and equipment, including James who joined us at the end of the morning to help tidy up.

Eleanor and I had both enjoyed opportunities to get in touch with some Mums outside of our sessions, doing home visits to deliver baking or meet a new baby. We all found that during the year the group began to feel like a support system for the adults who had concerns, often relating to the pandemic, and

who recognised Feilding Baptist as a safe place to talk with friends. It's worth noting that while other play groups required vaccine passes, our group was able to welcome anyone at all. This made a big difference to many of our Mums who were relieved about this.

We are looking forward to continuing with our group and seeing what God wants to do this year. We are grateful that Martin is happy for us to use the church for this ministry each Monday.

# Girls Brigade

The Juniors created letters and poems for Mother's Day, Random Acts of Kindness; painting rocks, bookmarks, friendship bracelets and made notes of gratitude to give to others. Juniors learnt about the Lord's Prayer and sang this at breakup.

The Seniors followed on from the watery start with a study on the Water cycles and experiments with water, and in Term 4 prepared a dance for breakup.

The Pioneers spent much time in the kitchen, making pasta, pizza, rolls, and lots of other yummy things. They were challenged with an evening of archery and spent many nights being very creative, like button art pictures and art work based on our GB Motto 'Seek, Serve and Follow Christ'.

The Juniors and Seniors got to know what is in their backyard, and the importance of birds and bugs. Everyone made animal trackers, and set them in their gardens. We found that there were lots of ants in peoples gardens, and we did find mouse prints in one tracker. The girls also all enjoyed making bird feeders, and a bug hotel to further encourage insects and birds into their own garden.

The whole company took on a Teddy bear project, where we

learnt the history of the Teddy bear.

The Juniors made felt teddy bears, or finger puppets. The Seniors made Teddy bears out of socks and one out of a towel. The Pioneers made a Teddy bear out fabric and used sewing machines to put them together. At the end of the term, we had a Teddy bears picnic, with heaps of food.

August came and we went into lockdown, but we made the most of it, we had Zoom GB!
During this time, we learnt about Africa. Everyone had to either make or draw an African animal and name three facts about their animal, the following week we did the same choosing an African country. When we were able to be back together we created a quiz using the facts the girls had shared.

# **ICONZ**

Feilding ICONZ runs during school term time on Wednesdays, 6-7.30pm. We have 2 divisions: Adventure section for boys 8-12 years old and the Extreme Section for boys 12 years old and over.

This year we were blessed with \$2000 from Feilding Lions to assist with the running of ICONZ. Some of this money subsidised Oscar, a young up and coming leader, to attend the BB & ICONZ

National Leaders Development Course at the Nelson Lakes National Park. This course tested the young men with heights, braving the elements, team work, problem-solving, extreme distances and some terrible weather.

In the Adventure section we did some research on countries and communities living in extreme poverty. It was heart breaking what people have to live through and the boys wanted to do something about it.

Thanks to Annie for teaching us how to make drip and mould candles which looked and smelt amazing. The boys practiced sales pitches and developed presentations to sell the candles, raising \$719.60 for CBM (Christian Blind Mission).

As it was the 2020 (held in 2021) Tokyo Olympics we looked at various records and events and finished off with a ridiculous tabloid Olympics event. Jacob taught the boys some fencing moves and various styles of dance.

Eric, Heather and Co. organised a very cool camp on the Baxter's farm with archery, target shooting, shelter building, hunting, orienteering, sled riding and delicious food.

Finally, we completed the Kartz badge. Kyle shared his racing go-kart and its various components. He also made 4 push go-karts which we raced in teams on the grass at the back of FBC. Miraculously, the boys followed

the agreed racing rules and there were no major incidents.

Feilding ICONZ Extreme boys started 2021 with a bit of community work where we cleared some people's yards, mulched some gardens and established some gardens where there were none. We then combined with Boys Brigade in Palmerston North for a camp in tents and had a lot of fun target shooting, cooking and car boot sledding.

We hit the gym and the pool in the colder months and developed some skills to keep us fit and active. We reconnected with Boys Brigade Palmy for a craft camp and then finished the year off learning forging techniques to make a slingshot.

## Mission

2021 saw our Church continue to support three overseas mission contexts; NZBMS in Kolkata and Thailand, CBM, and MAF. Within New Zealand we supported Palmerston North Hospital Chaplaincy, Grapevine Magazine, Eden Christian Kindy, and the three Feilding food banks.

Andrew, Roanna and family have completed their time with NZBMS in Thailand. They have the reward of knowing they have established and left Woven Life in good capable hands, settling into new roles in Wellington, grateful for God 's provision.

Ryan & Sophie also returned New Zealand. Ryan will work by distance from Christchurch. We will continue their support in 2022. Carol works with mums and children in a very challenging environment. She has created many initiatives over the last year and is clearly being a blessing to her adopted town.

Early in the year we were introduced to Benji, Jess and Elliott one Sunday morning after their break from serving with Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) in Papua New Guinea. Benji is an aircraft engineer, Jess is a nurse and helps with the health at a nearby orphanage. It is proposed we support the Hunt family in a similar way to the way we supported Andrew & Roanna.

We began our support to the Hunts by tithing our 2020 operating surplus with \$2200 passed on.

We also hosted Bridget, a pilot from MAF who was transferring from Timor-Leste to PNG. She spoke to the Girls' Brigade and to an evening gathering.

We receive regular updates from these people, if you would like to receive newsletters please let Eleanor know. And please pray for them.

Prior to Christmas, food items were collected via 'The Giving Tree' (take a labelled food item of your choice off the Tree & donate that item the following week) supporting Manchester House Food Bank. Each Sunday during the year our Food Basket offering supports the Salvation Army Food Bank. And we provided volunteers for Vinnies,

Our NZBMS Self Denial Appeal netted \$2149.30 and those using the Missionary Boxes contributed \$123.90.

The loose change appeal during Advent again supported CBM netting, \$768.00. The visual information each Sunday told of the transformation in children's lives. Great to be able to help.

# Admin Team

The most remarkable thing about 2021 was the number of repairs that we were able to complete. A couple of years earlier, we simply didn't have the money. These repairs simply

would have had to wait or we would have had to find second hand replacements.

Firstly was the hall heat pumps, where two of them had broken fans in their roof units. Then there were the under verandah smoke detectors. These had begun to corrode, and had already resulted in a false fire alarm one morning in 2020. This was a significant cost, but they have been replaced with units that are weather proof, so our children shouldn't have problems with those. And then, right in the middle of Easter, when we had multiple performers staying over for Easter Camp, the fridge stopped. Thanks to Andrew and Hazel for providing one we could borrow. It was so good to be able to buy a new fit for purpose model later in the year.

But the biggest improvement, was a hot water upgrade. We replaced the aging cylinder, future proofing ourselves, at the same time creating a means of safely heating our baptistry. We can be very grateful to Colin

Funnell for sleuthing a solution and completing the work.
The way our Sunday services are



conducted to keep people safe during Covid seems second nature now with hand sanitiser stations, distanced seating arrangements, increased ventilation, doors left open, online access to services, no offering bags passed around, people wearing face masks, scanning and signing in, and weekly attendance roll taken.

Thanks for the excellent turn out again for our annual Spring Clean. The building was looking considerably sharper by morning tea. And to James Woodfield for diligently cleaning each week.

# **Financial**

2021 has been an encouraging year FINANCIALLY. Our income has continued to meet our needs without any anxiety. Praise the Lord.

Covid restrictions have encouraged more members to change from envelope giving to Internet banking. This has meant an increase in giving for some – as it was said – "I found I have given more this year" – small regular amounts have made the difference.
