My lingering memory of 2023 is of sickness and weddings!
Fortunately there were some other things... Before the first wedding in mid January Influenza A struck, almost scuppering the wedding plans in Tauranga. The second wedding took place in May on the other side of Whanganui. This was followed with our first dose of Covid, and before the year was out, we received a second!

The excellent Alpha Pre Marriage course of five sessions preceded both weddings. These were conducted over Zoom with both couples, one in Adelaide,

the other in Dunedin. Though non churched, they appreciated the content.

In February (13th & 14th) Cyclone

Gabrielle caused incredible flooding and damage in Auckland and Hawkes Bay. We raised over \$1000 to send to Flaxmere Baptist who were coordinating many of the gifts from around the country. Our gift gave them the opportunity

to buy equipment to speed up the sorting and delivery of these products and was very gratefully received.

Also in February we signed off our Child Protection policy and practises. We engaged the team that delivered the ICONZ Child Protection nationally, and for a fee had ours completed, unique for us. We were very grateful for the huge amount of work Esmé Haigh had put into the foundations of this.

Easter Camp returned to Manfeild and once again we provided a significant volunteer

> contribution. On Good Friday local churches combined for a 'walk of the cross' and then a service in the Civic Centre. This included morning

tea, where, due to a misunderstanding, 150 packets of hot cross buns were delivered, instead of 150 buns... Thankfully Easter Camp took 600 of the surplus 750!



The coronation of King Charles (Saturday 6th May) provided the

opportunity to celebrate, Barb Funnell and her team lead a magnificent and fitting royal evening.



Around this time Lyndon Ingram along with Colin Funnell and Michael Taylor restarted the ball rolling for our Toilet Upgrade. We discovered along the way that this should have been completed ten years earlier, and our Building Warrant of Fitness actually required it to be done. The urgency and need to complete this was picked up by the congregation and by the end of the year \$70 000 of the \$200 000 needed had been donated.

July. This was a sobering time for our church, and followed on

from Jo Botha's shock death.

And it didn't end there with

three more to pass before the year was out; Elva Cooper, Will Telford, Alison Anderson.

Still we wouldn't want to paint a

picture of decline, with 31 new faces over the previous two years attending a Newcomers' Lunch in August. Our annual statistics for the Baptist Union were encouraging, up on 2022 but not quite back to pre-Covid levels.

Bridget Ingham's visit on 12th October saw our foyer full to hear of her work with Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF). It made me very glad of our support of this outstanding mission and aviator.



And in the same month we paused before two Sunday services to watch Rugby World Cup

matches from France, even shifting the start of one service to 1030 to enable pulses to



return to normal (and people to attend)!

A new initiative for us was Alpha's Parenting Teens Course. We ran this over five weeks using Zoom in October and November. Positive feedback was received.

Through the year the ministries of Cuppa Chat & Play, Girls Brigade, and ICONZ continued with excellent leadership and leadership support. Eric and Heather Relf concluded their time with ICONZ after decades of leadership. The Knit and Natter group was just superb, especially with support for Diane Botha. Eleanor's Thursday morning home group got underway, but the weekly prayer group became less regular.

Over the year Eleanor Keyte-Bailey continued to shed responsibilities, significantly the day to day finances that Nikki Waller took on for a time before outsourcing the bookkeeping to CATAS. And there was also a changing of the guard with Autumn Taylor handing over the reins of Newsletter Editor after 13 years to Lauretta Hannah.

Michael Taylor and Reon Hince completed their second term of three years as church elders requiring them to stand down. They were replaced by Matt Carter and Geoffrey Ward. Ruth McGee was elected again, beginning her second three year stint.

A popular feature of the midweek eNews was the Green Room, where people had the opportunity to add things to sell before using Trademe. As the year went on, the price of many of the items became 'contribution to the toilet fund'. It was impossible to predict which items would appeal, making me reflect that retailing is an interesting business! The much valued eNews deliverers (for those without email access) were Tanya Carter, Jenny Williamson and Eleanor.

A 'Thank You' lunch took place after a Sunday service in December. I am sincerely grateful for the high level of involvement we have at Feilding Baptist. From little behind the scenes things to higher profile things, the level of participation is superb. For that I am very thankful.

70 attendees enjoying the delicious treats served by the girls.

In addition to culinary pursuits, the girls engaged in various activities, including swimming sessions, crafts for Mother's and Father's Day, and the creation of a Tic-Tac-Toe game using rocks and a square board.

Martin, spoke about keeping

Feilding beautiful. The girls were both amused and horrified as he demonstrated the importance of cleanliness by tipping a bucket of rubbish on the floor, with the girls subsequently using rubbish tweezers to pick it up.

As a company, a commitment to community service was demonstrated by a night of picking up rubbish around Feilding, followed by a





well-deserved reward of hot chips on a cold and windy night.

The year concluded with the girls engaging in festive activities, creating Christmas crafts and learning the song for the break-up.

Meanwhile, the Pioneers had a creative and productive year, focusing on painting, sculpting, and crafting. Their projects included the Ten Commandments, pots for Mothers' Day, handmade cards, and various cooking activities.

while at the same time developing a practical appreciation of what God has done for us. The

Some of the activities we did were cooking and baking; developing useful domestic skills; outdoor survival cooking; fitness and strength training; competitions like paper planes and boat races; mini chemical reaction rockets; outdoor survival skills; digital game building using a range of coding languages; swimming.

Mission

AROTAHI – HANDCARVED MISSION

NZBMS-TRANZSEND-AROTAHI has been undergoing change & has been led to the new name "AROTAHI/Hand Carved Mission" – it is evident that there is continuing, ongoing 'carving' as new ways of doing things & new opportunities arise. The recent revisiting & inclusion of Māori input in Aotearoa is evidence of significant change & 'the borders' of where & how we support mission work have been opened wide.

What WE do here – Financially our church supports "Renew Together" (formerly called 'Prayer & Self Denial') Week – in the month of May – the focus being our national work in Kolkata & Bangladesh. Peter & Leonora are senior missionaries working with village churches & have been encouraged by an increase in numbers & greater commitment. CJ is a National (probably the first National we

have directly supported), a vital worker/overseer at JOYYA

Bangladesh. Joyya is a business providing employment to many who have been rescued from prostitution. This work has expanded not only to make & sell articles to provide wages but to provide community help – fresh drinking water fountains, legal advice, health clinics & even teaching to ride a bike – a great help with transport.

Over recent years our church has developed an interest in the work of MAF – Mission Aviation Fellowship NZ. We support Benji, Jess & Elliott Hunt. Benji is an aircraft engineer-'Maintenance Operation Supervisor", in the hangar at Mt Hagen. He is also very gifted in getting alongside & teaching national staff & encouraging them to train. Jess has a nursing background & at times has helped by visiting medical centres; she has a warm personality & contributes a lot at the mission compound in integrating the large staff who come from various nationalities. Elliott is now about 8 and is now



home schooled. When here on home assignment Elliott attended Mt Biggs School for a term. His comment the first day – "they have flush toilets & they are CLEAN." Martin & I were able to attend their public meeting held in Bulls.

Through this interest in MAF we have met Bridget Ingham, a pilot based at Mt Hagan. She not only is gifted musically & academically but writes monthly newsletters interspersed with a mid-month Prayer Update – a lot of dedication & discipline to manage that. Those of us who follow these newsletters have a glimpse of the skill & dedication needed to upskill & fly in such steep terrain & variable weather. We have supported her with 'on-off' donations.

Christian Blind Mission – CBM (a

NZ based initiative) Four years ago we held a 'small change' appeal for the work done in various countries where operations are needed for blindness, orthopaedic deformities & the like. This has

become an annual appeal & we have gladly given \$1082.70 dollars at year end 2023.

Mission at HOME: Within New Zealand we have budgeted \$200 each (\$1,000 pa) support for:

- Hospital Chaplaincy
- o Grapevine magazine
- Hope Project (letter box drops of booklets @ Easter & Christmas)
- Eden Christian Kindy
- Feilding Christmas Parade shortbread given out with a 'Christmas message' an initiative of Feilding Christian Leaders Network

Several folk here receive & support Missionary news 'direct' but we also print & deliver the Arotahi weekly Prayer Calendar & Missionaries letters as they arrive.

Other missionaries we have met over the years are: Jo & Charlie; Ross & Cindy; Peter, Dasha & baby Sean with a co-worker Frances; Joel & Lizzie with Lydia & Noelle; "Woven Life" – work in Thailand

Admin & Maintenance Team

Every couple of years we have had an act of vandalism against

the building. This year it was the foyer window where the laminated glass put up a good fight before a large rock was punched through. Toughened glass was the prompt replacement.

Not long after two of the three

unlaminated and non-toughed windows were discovered, with rocks thrown through one, and into another, both outside office windows. These again were replaced with toughened glass.

Later in October the outside office wall received a large red tag as part of an extended tour around town that included St Paul's hall, other CBD buildings and bridges. This took two coats of paint to cover.

Concern was then expressed that the remaining standard

glass window in the Minister's Office would make a considerable mess should it be targeted. It was finally decided to replace the entire window,

> frame and all with double glazed toughed glass. This has significantly aided security.

The annual Spring Clean included an emptying of the loft in preparation for the toilet upgrade. A considerable quantity of

'treasure' had been squirreled away. The flower room and 'Six Week' room were also sorted. A small portion was rehoused, some was sold, and a large quantity 'left the building'.





Two new kitchen trolleys are the only notable purchase in 2023.

We budgeted to replace eleven of the Exit lights (\$2500), but surprisingly these passed the winter test. A more noticeable upgrade in 2024 could be a roller hatch for the kitchen, making cleanup more peaceful for groups using the foyer.

Once again many thanks to the Admin Team; Andrew Robertson, Eleanor Keyte-Bailey, Jan Hosick, Eric Relf, Heather Relf, Colin Funnell, and Barb Funnell. And to the large number who helped during the year with maintenance and care of the building.

Thanks too to James and Brenda Woodfield for weekly cleaning.
